**ENGLISH DEPARTMENT** 

Departmental approval date: April 19, 2023

ENGL 233: Editing and Publishing a Literary Journal

3 class hrs. 1 recitation hour/3 credits

Prerequisite: ENGL102

Co-requisite: None

### **Course Description for college catalog:**

This course offers an opportunity for students to develop and practice the skills necessary to create and publish a literary journal for a readership of the campus community and beyond. Students will compose, solicit, collect, edit, and present fiction, poetry, creative nonfiction, and/or hybrids in print and/or digital format(s). Students will learn the conventions of literary genres and through reading and discussing regional, national and/or international literary journals learn about the aesthetics of layout and presentation. They will apply this knowledge in the production, promotion and distribution of the QCC campus literary journal. Students will work with Student Activities, such as the Creative Writing Club and Art Club to increase submissions and promote the journal.

### Rationale:

Currently, the QCC literary journal, *Collective*, is published once a year in the spring. The vast majority of the work is done by two professors, Alison Cimino and Benjamin Miller, and a few dedicated students. It is work-intensive, and its existence depends on the good will and service of professors amenable to seeing the yearly project through. We propose establishing a publishing class to discuss the craft and process of creating a literary journal, culminating each term in the collaborative publication and distribution of the QCC journal.

By creating ENGL-233, the literary journal will be more student-centered than currently, and it will emphasize the experience of creating a literary publication for the QCC community. By publishing the literary journal as a class project, the pedagogical benefits will be felt by up to 24 students per semester. In addition, this experiential learning opportunity will allow for more student involvement in outreach, soliciting material, editing, designing, composing, and other initiatives such as taking the journal online. QCC already has several courses that afford students the opportunity to compose creative writing (ENGL 220, 221, 222, 261, 301 to name a few); ENGL-233 will be an opportunity for students to work on the publication side, developing skills that will be useful in their post-college experiences, especially in New York City, an international hub for publishing. The student work will be eligible for national awards such as the Community

College Humanities Association's Best Literary Magazine. The implementation of designing the journal touches on several high impact practices, as there can be collaboration with other courses (art and design, information technology), utilizing SWIG or Academic Service Learning. The course will also be Writing Intensive.

Presently, the production of *Collective* without a class is unsustainable. If the professors who run the journal leave QCC or their interests change, then the literary journal—a vital campus resource that serves as an opportunity for students to see their writing in print—will be in danger of disappearing. In addition, in its current shape, only a very few students volunteer to organize and discuss submissions. Making production of the journal a class will widen participation up to 24 students for this experiential activity. Also, including a course on literary publication will add to creative writing offerings in the English Department and support the new English Major at QCC.

### 2. NEW COURSE

### **ENGLISH DEPARTMENT**

Departmental approval date: November 30, 2022 INTE-219 Introduction to Black, Race and Ethnic Studies

3 class hours 1 recitation hour 3 credits

Prerequisite: ENGL-102

Co-requisite: None

Course Description for College Catalog:

This interdisciplinary course seeks to study the histories, literatures, cultures, and lived experiences of Black, Indigenous, People of Color (BIPOC) as they navigate the institutional and social structures that help them strive and keep them oppressed. The course builds cultural competency and instructs students to explore how settler colonialism, imperialist capitalism, and other contemporary and historical inequities impede social justice. The course investigates the roots of racism, the construction of whiteness, and the perpetuation of anti-blackness. Further, it celebrates the hard-won victories that have helped to advance racial and ethnic diplomacy and ethnic joy.

#### Rationale:

The college's new interdisciplinary concentration, "Black, Race and Ethnic Studies" requires a foundational course to ground students in the ideas, texts, and concepts they will encounter in the rest of their courses for this concentration.

### 3. **NEW COURSE**

DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH PHYSICAL EDUCATION AND DANCE

Departmental approval date: April 19, 2023

HE 203 Public Health Internship

90 hours, 2 credits

Prerequisite: HE103, IS1 51 or HE114

Co-requisite: None

Course Description for College Catalog:

This course will provide students with practical learning experiences working in the field of public health. They will apply skills learned in the classroom to real-life public health issues. Students will improve critical thinking and problem-solving skills needed and explore career opportunities prior to graduation. Students must have passed HE 103 and IS 151 or HE 114 with a C or higher. Departmental Permission Required.

#### Rationale:

This course is designed for undergraduate students to experience some of the real-life challenges of public health, nutrition, community health and health education. By working on current public health

issues under the close supervision and mentorship of experienced professionals, students apply classroom learning to field experience. In the process, they learn critical and problem-solving skills needed to excel in the field.

### 4. **NEW COURSE**

DEPARTMENTOF BIOLOGICAL SCIENCES AND GEOLOGY Departmental approval date: April 19, 2023 BI-526, Field Internship in Public Health 2 credits

Prerequisite: Open only to matriculated students who have completed at least 12 credits of required courses in the Public Health curriculum, including, BI 520 Introduction to Public Health course; have a minimum cumulative index of 2.0; and are recommended by the departmental adviser. Students must contact the departmental adviser during the semester, prior to enrollment to make necessary arrangements.

Co-requisite: None

### Course Description for College Catalog:

This internship is strongly recommended for students intending to pursue careers in Public Health. Students can earn up to 2 credits to satisfy electives requirements in the Public Health curriculum.

Students are placed for internship or field experience in selected governmental or nongovernmental organizations that are involved in advancing the health of communities, including underserved, and global populations through education, research, outreach, and service, both locally, nationally, and globally, through collaborative public health approaches to health promotion and disease prevention and intervention. Students are selected by the adviser for this course based on academic preparation and suitability for the field experience, subject to the availability of the site. This course facilitates valuable work experience and increases knowledge of specific career opportunities. Placements are semesterlong (90 hours) and provide the opportunity to observe a public health professional in practice, complete a project that is mutually beneficial to the student and the organization, and synthesize knowledge and skills into public health practice. Course requirements include two mini progress reports, and submission of a final report covering the activities participated in during the experience. The student is also required to submit a timesheet and two supervisor evaluations, one in the middle of the internship and the other at the end. The final grade is determined by the departmental adviser. All internships must be completed before graduation to be included in the student's degree certification.

### Rationale:

Employers in the Public Health field are more than ever looking for students who come with some amount of fieldwork or internship experience. Through this, students will be able to develop key competencies, skills, and work characteristics that employers seek in the field of Public Health. As future members of the

Public Health workforce, this increases awareness of the needs, challenges, and career opportunities in the field.

### Course Description for College Catalog:

This course provides an introduction to social media and internet marketing. It is designed to cover an overview of the digital marketing-related concepts and provide students with an introduction to different marketing tools to be used such as email marketing, social media channels, mobile and various issues such as measuring marketing effectiveness, online privacy and security. Students will get an understanding of how companies are utilizing digital marketing strategies to interact with customers and improve their engagement.

#### Rationale:

This new course provides students with the theories and conceptual knowledge related to digital marketing that is currently used within the industry.

Course Description for College Catalog:

This course provides an introduction to data analytics as it is used in Marketing. Students will learn how to use various information systems and software tools to collect and analyze data and create infographics for marketing decision support including: search engine optimization, multimedia optimization, ad revenue optimization, social media, e-mail and ad campaign optimization. Students will also learn the basics of regression analysis and how neural networks and several different machine learning techniques are applied in price prediction modeling, customer satisfaction analysis, campaign analysis, market segmentation analysis, and market basket analysis.

#### Rationale:

This new course provides students with hands-on practical knowledge related to data and marketing analysis that is currently used within the industry.
