A.S. in Criminal Justice leading to the B.S. in Criminal Justice at the John Jay College of Criminal Justice Catalog Year 2025-26

The dual/joint degree program in Criminal Justice between Queensborough Community College and John Jay College of Criminal Justice is a jointly registered, dual-admission program. Students who complete the A.S. degree may transfer to John Jay and complete a B.S. degree in 2 years. Students who complete the program will be well prepared for many employment opportunities in criminal justice and related fields.

The number of credits you take each year will determine when you graduate. To graduate on time, you are strongly encouraged to enroll in at least 30 credits toward your degree during the calendar year, including fall and spring semesters and winter and summer sessions. This degree map is designed for students who place into **ENGL-101** and **MA-119**. An additional map is available for students who must complete developmental math or English. Please see the degree website or your advisor for more information.

- 2. Students who are exempt from MA-119 will use MA-336 to satisfy Required Core 1B and must take either CRIM-201 or CRIM-204 to complete the 60-credit degree.
- 3. Two sequential courses in the same language are recommended. Please visit the <u>Department of Modern Languages and Cultures</u> for placement into the first course.
- 4. This course is not required for students who take a 4-credit STEM variant course in Required Core 1C.

All students must complete two (2) WI designated classes to fulfill degree requirements.
