### President's Report to the Academic Senate

### April 10, 2018

### ENROLLMENT MANAGEMENT UPDATE

- The Office of Admissions is focused on reaching enrollment targets for Fall 2018. Recruitment activity has begun which includes attending college fairs and private visits in Queens and Nassau County. The College has admitted 10,000 new students for Fall 2018 thus far and phase application deliveries are scheduled through June 2018. The office is open for Direct Admissions and has already received close to 160 direct admission students. We continue to work in collaboration with key offices on campus to support students with the enrollment process which includes inviting them to register nearly a month earlier than Fall 2017.
- Summer/Fall 2018 advisement and registration for incoming and continuing students is currently underway in the Academies and special program offices, a month earlier than last spring. Advisers have completed their initial outreach to all probation students. Currently, advisers are concentrating outreach efforts to non-probation students, while conducting follow-up with probation students.

### **ACADEMIC AFFAIRS**

### Middle States

• The self-study process continues. Led by the three executive co-chairs—Dr. Antonella Ansani, Dean Arthur Corradetti, and Prof. Kelly Ford—the seven working groups have each developed a draft of their chapter for the self-study report, each chapter devoted to one of the seven Middle States standards. Final versions of the chapters from the working groups will be completed by June. A draft of the full self-study report will be developed during the summer and distributed to the campus for comment and suggestions in Fall 2018; the full self-study report is due to Middle States in February 2019. An evaluation team chair, Dr. Joann La Perla-Morales, president at Middlesex Community College, has been selected for the college's site visit. Dr. La Perla-Morales will make a preliminary site visit in the Fall, will provide comment and suggestions for the draft self-study report, and will then return with the full evaluation team in March 2019. At that time, the evaluation team will be on campus for two and a half days, providing a preliminary site visit report before they leave campus. The Middle States Commission will make a final decision on the college's reaccreditation in June 2019.

### Academic Momentum Plan

• **STEM Waiver -** For the 2018 Summer Session 1, over 1,800 requests were made through the online application system in just 5 days. Those requests are being processed, and STEM Waivers are being awarded in the order that they were received until the funding is exhausted. The goal of these STEM Waivers is to promote credit

accumulation in STEM courses while not jeopardizing TAP eligibility. Student fees are not covered by the waiver. Upon completion of the course with a letter grade of A through F, the tuition waiver will be applied.

• Milestone Scholarship - Queensborough is continuing to help students reach their "thirty-credit milestone" by granting Summer Session 2018 scholarships. Over 350 eligible students have been invited to apply for a scholarship this summer. The scholarship will be applied to a course in which a student is enrolled during Summer Session 2018. Upon completion of that course the student will have met or exceeded the "thirty- credit milestone" of their education here at Queensborough.

### **STUDENT RESOURCES**

- The Carroll and Milton Petrie Foundation renewed QCC's three-year grant, of up to \$100,000 per year, for three years, to provide **one-time, emergency grants** to students in good standing with **short-term financial emergencies** to enable them to remain in school, rather than being forced to leave or drop out. Ms. Karen O'Sullivan, Associate Director of Student Financial Services, will serve as the Grants Manager for this campus initiative. On March 14, the Steering Committee was represented by Joel Kuszai at a meeting of the Committee on the Environment, Quality of Life and Disability Issues, chaired by Dominic Hull (Chemistry). The committee meeting was also attended by FEC Chair Pecorino, VP Faulkner, Lt. Black of Public Safety, and Michael Betancur, SGA Parliamentarian, who spoke on behalf of students. The first and major agenda item was a discussion of the current situation with parking on campus. It was a robust conversation that reviewed the matter, with thorough airing from both faculty and students. It is mentioned here as evidence of the fact that consideration of the parking issue is ongoing.

On Friday, March 30, 2018 an incident occurred on campus and around noon two email messages were sent, one notifying the community of the incident, and the other that the campus was deemed safe by the NYPD. Since Friday afternoon, the Steering Committee has been in communication with Vice Presidents Newcomb and Di Dio as well as John Triolo, Director of Public Safety. The matter remains under investigation by the NYPD.

Finally, we say goodbye to some members of the Senate this month as their terms are expiring. ### **III. Senate Elections**

As detailed in the February 2018 report, nominating petitions were distributed to faculty and staff for the election of new Faculty and CLT Members-at-Large. The Senate consists of 41 Faculty Members-at-Large and 2 CLT Members-at-Large. 15 Faculty were nominated for 13 positions and 2 CLTs were nominated for one position, all of which will run through April 2021. The election was conducted online for two weeks in March. The online system was managed by Jeffrey Schwartz (Senate Technology Officer) with assistance from Raj Vaswani (Information Technology).

The CoC sent out emails in March to HEO's and Adjuncts asking for petitions for nominations to be elected to the Academic Senate. Extending the deadline twice 5 HEO's sent in their petitions while no petitions were submitted by Adjuncts. The elections for HEO's will run in April.

IV Nominations to Standing Committees of the Academic Senate

Faculty and HEOs were invited to select the committees on which they would prefer to serve via an online system. The database was managed by Raj Vaswani and the list of eligible instructional staff was assembled by Debra DiBattista (Human Resources and Labor Relations). At least two reminder emails were sent out during the selection period.

81 members of the instructional staff indicated their committee preferences. There are a total of 129 committee seats, but only 47 open positions.

Following the online selection period, the preferences for each committee were examined by the CoC Chair and a master table was prepared. Candidates were eliminated from committee ballots if their Department was already represented on that committee. The CoC met two times, on February 28<sup>th</sup> and March 14<sup>th</sup>, and made its first round of committee assignments. For each committee, the candidates' qualifications were considered, as well as the need for College service with respect to tenure and promotion. Adjustments to the ballot were made via email. An effort was made to balance the distribution of candidates across departments. This became difficult with large departments outweighing small to mid-size departments. A ballot was eventually approved.

In accordance with Article VII, section 4a of the Bylaws, the ballot must be circulated to the instructional staff at least two weeks before the election. The ballot was circulated via email to faculty, HEOs and CLTs on March 27, in advance of the April 10 Senate Meeting.

Following the election, the CoC will maintain a list of instructional staff not placed on a committee. This list will be consulted to fill vacancies as they arise during the year. The CoC will also make suggestions to the Steering Committee regarding suitable Steering Committee Designees. The ballot and petition form are found at the end of this report.

### V Committee on Committees Election at the May Academic Senate Meeting

The terms of three members of the CoC will expire in May: Richard Yuster, Barbara Blake Campbell, and Pete Mauro. At the May meeting of the Academic Senate, nominations for new members will be presented, followed by a vote.

#### Rationale:

This is not a new course. The course content has been updated to reflect trends in marketing communications. The growing importance of Integrated Marketing Communications (IMC) is a major trend in the 21st century marketing. Thanks to the Internet, social media, and enhanced access to databases, marketers can engage consumers one-on-one. Marketers are no longer focused solely on directing finely tuned messages to their target audiences. Today marketers increasingly seek to establish a collaborative dialogue with members of their target audiences. Advertising is the use of paid announcements from a known sponsor in media: Broadcast, print, and out-of-home. Advertising was once the hub of the marketing communications wheel. Over the last thirty years, however, other promotional tools—consumer and trade promotions, marketing public relations, direct response, and interactive online tools—have received a greater share of marketers' communications budgets. Advertising is now just another spoke on the marketing communications vehicles so compelling brands and collaborative relations can be built with the brand's stakeholders. In recognition of the evolving nature of marketing communications, we propose changing the name of Elements of Advertising to Integrated Marketing Communications.

#### Course Description for college catalog:

This course is designed to prepare students for the transition to a professional and business environment. Topics include assisting students in the decision-making process, their business career skills, and employability. Students will gain knowledge and valuable skills that will help them to market themselves to potential employers and to prepare themselves to enter the business and virtual environment.

#### Rationale:

Professional business development is a key component for students when transitioning from college to the workplace. Career development is being conducted at every level of learning—colleges, community learning centers, libraries, alumni services, etc. This course is designed to assist the entry-level, returning, and veteran worker to prepare for employment, and once employed, how to be a productive, professional individual. Specific topics will allow students to understand the various areas of communication and multimodal methods used in the business environment.

With such a diverse population in the workplace, people are not accustomed to the appropriate business and communication techniques relating to employee recruitment consideration, professional workplace advancement, and/or company-related professionalism.

Participation in this class will allow students to develop in the work-related environment, while, at the same time, advance into acceptable, impressive, qualified, professional individuals.

• The Lucille A. Bova Food Pantry has been operating since February 1, 2018, with the following hours:

#### **Committee Activities**

• Last semester, the FEC created a "Faculty Association" bank account, which has been holding money from faculty who prefer to donate by check to the Lucille A. Bova Food Pantry. As of this writing, this money has been used to reimburse Amazon/Cosco orders to the pantry, upon the presentation of receipts approved and recorded in meeting minutes by the Committee on Food Insecurity. FEC Treasurer Margot Edlin has both received checks from generous donors, and disbursed reimbursement funds to Dr. Susan Jacobowitz, and to herself, as the Food Pantry was stocked, in December, January, and, more recently in March, by three separate trips to Cosco.

While the FEC has indicated that they plan to terminate financial bank account support for the Lucille A Bova Food Pantry at the close of the calendar year 2018, the FEC will be encouraging donations to the Pantry at the Faculty Meeting, now rescheduled (after an initial cancellation due to weather conditions), for **Wednesday, April 18<sup>th</sup> 2018**. In kind donations to the Pantry will be received at the entrance to Medical Arts 136 on that day, and transported by members of the Food Insecurity Committee, as well as volunteer students from Queensborough's Lambda Sigma Chapter of Phi Theta Kappa and other co-sponsoring clubs.

- As per the notice above, the FEC and members of the Food Insecurity Committee have called for the establishment of the Lucille A. Bova Food Pantry as a separate, non-profit entity, as soon as possible, as members of the FEC have expressed reservation regarding possible liabilities to the FEC. This process is now underway. As of this writing, members of the Committee on Food Insecurity, working in tandem with members of the FEC, are reviewing the following possible names for the Food Pantry:
- Oakland Food Pantry Association
- Bayside Food Pantry Association
- Northeast Queens Food Pantry Association
- Bayside College Food Pantry Association
- Bayside Campus Hunger Coalition (or Alliance).

The last, as of this writing, has strong support. The Chair of the Committee has also been consulting with attorneys and experienced laymen (Dr. Sharon Masrour, Director of the Nassau Community College Food Pantry; Professor Beena Ahmed, of the CUNY Law School and Books Through Bars) regarding the crafting of bylaws language. A meeting with President Call and Vice-President Newcomb, in which progress around this project will be reviewed and discussed, is scheduled, as of this writing, for Wednesday, April 11 at 3 P.M. Representatives from the Student Government Association; the Faculty Executive Committee; the Steering Committee; and the Committee on Food Insecurity will attend.

- The Committee on Food Insecurity is happy to report that partnership with the *Love Through Food* campaign, a New York based Outreach Program dedicated to addressing Food Insecurity among college students (<u>https://www.classy.org/team/156671</u>) raised \$452.00 from Queensborough Faculty. Special thanks go to Mr. Jonathan Chin (*Love Through Food*'s organizer); Dr. Lana Zinger, Dr. Jonathan Cornick; and Dr. Stephen Henriquez. Thanks also to Drs. Susan Jacobowitz and Peter Bales, who will be helping to transport the packed meals purchased through *LoveThroughFood* to the Lucille A Bova Food Pantry some time between the packing event (schedule for Monday, April 2), and Wednesday, April 11. This activity will yield 1500 packed meals for students, which will be held in the food pantry.
- Professor Tai has also been in contact with Father Edward Doran, the new director of the Newman Center. Father Edward has indicated that the Newman Center will continue to partner with the Committee on Food Insecurity, by offering students who visit the Newman Center fresh fruits. In support of this partnership, the Newman Center, in

concert with the Chemistry Club and the Lambda Sigma Chapter of Phi Theta Kappa, will be sponsoring a "Fruit, Snacks and Study" Afternoon, from noon to 2 PM, at the Newman Center on Wednesday, April 18<sup>th</sup>.

- Professor Tai has also been working with Queensborough's NYPIRG Chapter, which collected feminine hygiene products during the month of March and donated them to the Lucille A. Bova Food Pantry.
