STUDENT AFFAIRS

Enrollment Management Update

• The first two recommendation files of freshmen students have been received by the Office of Admissions. With these two files, nearly 6,000 freshmen will receive notification of acceptance. The College also received the recommendation file for transfer students, which included 102 admitted transfers. The Office of New Student Engagement will host the first New Student Enrollment Day for the Fall 2018 enrollment cycle on Monday, March 25th. During the session, newly admitted students and their families will learn more about the College, including the Academies and special programs such as ASAP, College Discovery, and CUNYStart. They will also meet with staff from Admissions, Financial Aid, and Testing to assist them with steps in the enrollment process.

Academic advisement within the Queensborough Academies began on Monday, February 25th. Hobson Retain communications have been sent out to all Academy students.

Personnel Appointments

The Division of Student Affairs is proud to announce the appointment of Dr. Chanpreet Singh as the Director of Counseling, effective Monday, March 4, 2019. Dr. Singh joins the college after having served almost ten (10) years as a Counseling Psychologist/Senior Rehabilitation Counselor for the United States Department of Veterans Affairs, providing counseling services to 150+ disabled veterans of the armed forces. She is a Licensed Mental Health Counselor, having served as a Certified Rehabilitation Counselor for seven (7) years at the New York State Education Department (ACCES-VR). In addition to clinical work, Dr. Singh has taught at as an Adjunct Assistant Professor at New York University, MA Counseling Program 2003-2005; Fordham University, MA Counseling Program 2011-2012; and Capella University, BA Health Administration Program 2009-2012. Also, she is a permanent Adjunct Assistant Professor at Queens College, MA School and Mental Health Counseling Program and has taught for the program since 2009. Furthermore, she is a contributing editor to the Journal of Military and Government Counseling. Her current research interests include independent living needs of veterans with traumatic brain injury and exploring the role of resilience in the treatment of trauma among women and South East Asian minority groups. Her educational credentials include a B.A. in Psychology from

Queens College, M.A. in Neuropsychology from the CUNY Graduate Center, a second M.A. in Rehabilitation Counseling from New York University, and a Ph.D. in Human Services from Capella University. Please join me in welcoming Dr. Singh to the Queensborough community!

- Four (4) Queensborough students have been nominated to participate in the 2019 Model New York State Senate Session Project. Ms. Carol Almonte, Ms. Kenia Bravo, Mr. Matthew DiBono, and Ms. Annalisa Gobind will participate in an intensive training program consisting of evening/weekend sessions with faculty mentors. They will learn about New York State government, representation and the legislative process. The program culminates with a trip to the State Capitol in Albany, where students debate public policy in the Senate Chamber. An added feature of the Model Senate Project is the opportunity to compete for scholarships awarded by the NYS Assembly and Senate Puerto Rican/Hispanic Task Force, as well as summer internships with members of the state legislature. The Model Senate Session, now in its 23rd year, is designed to provide SOMOS student participants from CUNY with a unique opportunity to develop leadership skills in a legislative/policy-making setting, emphasizing critical thinking and communication.

- All currently enrolled students wishing to receive financial aid for the Fall 2019 and/or Spring 2020 semesters are advised to complete the 2019-2020 Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) by the Priority Filing Deadline Date of April 5, 2019. Supported through a grant from *The Carroll and Milton Petrie Foundation*, the funds provide one-time, emergency grants to students in good standing with short-term financial emergencies to enable them to remain in school, rather than being forced to leave or drop out. Ms. Veronica Lukas, Executive Director of Student Financial Services, will be sending periodic e-mail reminders to the college community outlining the grant eligibility and encouraging faculty and staff to refer students to apply. Kupferberg Holocaust Center

The current exhibit, on view through May, is *Conspiracy of Goodness: How French Protestants Rescued Thousands of Jews during WWII*. This display presents the story of how an isolated Huguenot community in the Haute-Loire region saved approximately 3,500 Jews from Nazi Germany and the soldiers of Vichy France. Villagers of Le Chambon-sur-Lignon and the surrounding villages joined together to conceal, rescue and provide false documentation for Jews and French Resistance fighters at great risk to their own lives.

The KHC/NEH Colloquium Series for 2018-2019, Survivance on Turtle Island: Engaging with Native American Cultural Survival, Resistance and Allyship, is led by the KHC 2018-2019 Curator-in-Residence, Kat Griefen, from the Department of Art & Design. The eighth event in the series, Standing with Standing Rock: Allyship and the Environment, will be held on Wednesday, March 13, 2019 at 12:10 p.m. This program will address the ongoing resistance movements lead by indigenous people and allies of different cultures and faiths. Speakers include: Rabbi Mordechai Liebling, the Director of the Social Justice Organizing Program at the Reconstructionist Rabbinical College, and Rachel Waters, a graduate student at the New School's Milano School of International Affairs.

As part of the KHC 2018-2019 Cinema Series, the Center will be showing the film *A Film Unfinished* on Wednesday, March 27, 2019 at 12:10 p.m. Discovered after the war, this work is an unfinished propaganda film shot by the Nazis in the Warsaw Ghetto in May, 1942. Group discussion will follow.

Looking ahead, on **Sunday, April 14, 2019 at 12:00 p.m.**, the KHC will hold its annual **Holocaust Freedom Seder** in the QCC Student Union. Join us as we honor local Holocaust survivors by recreating the same Passover Seder that was held in 1946, the first to be held after the end of World War II. You can reserve a seat with a \$14 donation to the KHC, but students can attend for free. Pre-registration is required for this special event.
