In addition, at other CUNY Justice Academy colleges with Criminal Justice degree programs that require Criminology, there is one or more credit-bearing course pre-requisite. QCC is the only CJA partnership unit that requires only remedial reading.

CRIM102 will be converted to CRIM205 with pre-requisites of CRIM101 and CRIM106. The other 200-level major course requirements – CRIM201, CRIM202, CRIM203, CRIM204 – will have their pre-requisites revised to CRIM101 and CRIM106.

Explain briefly how students currently in the program will be able to complete the requirements.

Current students may complete the program requirements that existed prior to this revision and continue to progress to graduation accordingly, or they may opt to migrate to the new curriculum and follow its requirements. If students opt to follow the old curriculum, they will be required to take CRIM205 as equivalent to the old CRIM102, and they will be waived from the prerequisites of CRIM101 and CRIM106.
